over \$50,000 to go toward the four local, national and international efforts.

"We gave some suggestions for multiplying the money," said Greenway, "but people really used their creativity to come up with their own ideas. One lady sold over \$300 worth of homemade pies. A gentleman sold \$600 worth of manure for gardening. We set up a marketplace at the church on weeknights to allow people to sell their wares. We even had a church-wide yard sale."

So far, two of the four charitable efforts have received their share of the proceeds. A Volunteers in Mission (VIM) Team hand-carried a check for \$12,500 down to UMCOR representatives in New Orleans (see related story on page 7). The money is being allocated to repair a flood-ravaged home of a retired, disabled veteran who swam for his life to leave that house after the water crested twelve to thirteen feet in that area.

The second installment of the proceed money was presented to Bob Davis, Director of Jackson Area Ministries, for the purpose of aiding in the construction of their new headquarters. Reynoldsburg United Methodist Church has partnered with Jackson Area Ministries for the past twenty-six years in providing WorkCamp teams to southeastern Ohio locations.

The remaining funds will be allocated later this summer—on August 10, by way of a truckload of food to be distributed to the Mid-Ohio Food Bank and funds

to Reynoldsburg Helping Hands—and in January 2009 when a mission team travels to Africa to partner in the construction of a church there.

"We are celebrating the success of this effort with our people to reinforce that their efforts are truly making a difference," added Greenway.







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
